Of Mice and Men by John Steinbeck


Book Of Mice and Men is a powerful novella about friendship, dreams, and loneliness during the Great Depression. The story follows two migrant workers, George and Lennie, who dream of owning a piece of land. While George is practical and protective, Lennie, who has a mental disability is gentle but unintentionally destructive.

Steinbeck masterfully explores themes of isolation, as many characters struggle with loneliness and a sense of disconnection. The novel highlights the fragility of dreams in a harsh world, with the characters' aspirations often thwarted by circumstances beyond their control.

• Profession: Actor, Writer, Playwright, Songwriter


• Famous Works: Co-writer of the beloved Czech film series Kolya and The Elementary School (Obecná škola).

THE OLD SICILIAN TRADITIONS

THE STORY OF SICILY WAS TOLD BY SOME OLD SICILIAN TRADITIONS


In the XIX century, Sicily lived during a period of transition, which was characterizedbyimportantsocial,political and economical shifts. Because of this we can find several different traditions like the chariot, "the Marrabecca" and foods like "the nougat".



One of the oldest traditions is the **Sicilian Chariot**, linked to mules and donkeys in order to make it move. It was used as mean of transport in mountainous routes. It was pulled by animals and the vehicle had two wheels. Another thing is that the Chariot had **particular decorations**, which had flowery patterns, scenes of daily life, religious representations and mythological or historical elements.

In Sicilian legend scopes, we can find many monstrous characters, like The **Marrabecca**, she is a **witch** who stepped foot in all of Italy, having names and aspect depending on religions.

She lived in cisterns and they said that she devoured curious children that came close to her to keep them away. Nobody ever saw her because she only acts at midnight.



Musically, there were many famous Sicilian musicians, like Vincenzo Bellini. He was one of the most important Italian composer of the XIX century. He was born in Catania on the 3rd of November 1801. He was a son and nephew of artisans. He demonstrated right away his interest for music and when he was 14 he went to live with his grandfather, a famous composer.

One of his most famous works is "The Norma". It tells about a love story in the period of war between the Gauls and the Romans.

A traditional Christmas recipe is the Sicilian Nougat. Its origin could be traced back from arabic culture. Its recipe consists of toasting almonds and pistachios and mixing them in the cracked egg white and sugar.
